

## Orthographic Mapping Activity

Use this exercise for guided and independent practice so students master the fundamental skill of orthographic mapping on their journey to becoming skilled readers. Learners will connect the sounds of spoken language to the written symbols in text and unlock the secrets of efficient word recognition. A template has been provided below the directions for use with your learners.

Step 1: Say the word. Have the student repeat the word.	"ship"
Step 2: Use fingers to count the phonemes.	"sh" - "i" - "p"
Step 3: Place counters on the squares of the board to indicate the number of phonemes.	
Step 4: Write the word. Repeat the word. Then, say the sounds as you underline the letters that represent the sounds.	ship >>>> "ship" <u>sh</u> <u>i</u> <u>p</u>

Step 5: Place the written word out of sight. Have the					
student push the counters into the circles provided, and then, write the letter(s) that make the sound in the now empty boxes.

The teacher will underline the letters that represent each sound.</li> <li>□ Push a counter into the circle provided for the beginning sound.</li> <li>□ Write the letter(s) that make the sound in the now empty box.</li> <li>□ Repeat this process until you have mapped the whole word.</li> <li>□ Check your mapping with your teacher or a peer.</li> </ul>
